# AJ Bell Cautious Starter portfolio half-yearly update

### Commentary

Over the second half of 2024, the Cautious portfolio delivered a positive return of +2.4%. This brings the portfolio's total return since launch on 12 December 2018, to +21.7%.


Throughout most of the period, investor sentiment was relatively benign as global inflation fell in line with market expectations and economies remained resilient despite high interest rates. This led the Bank of England to cut rates in August, the first time in four years, with the U.S. Federal Reserve following suit with an even larger cut in September. However, with inflation rising again and proposed fiscal policies potentially increasing inflation on both sides of the Atlantic, expectations over further interest rate cuts have decreased.

Against this backdrop, fixed income market performance in fixed income markets was mixed. The reduced expectation of further rate cuts was bad for government bonds, while the resilience seen in the economy helped credit spreads (the premium that investors receive for lending to companies rather than governments), as investors remained confident in the ability of companies to repay their debts. Despite a difficult end of the year for fixed income, which accounts for 80% of this portfolio, it was reassuring to see this allocation still contributing +0.9% to returns.

Elsewhere, global equities rose over the period, notably benefitting from a 'Trump rally' after his victory in the U.S. Presidential election at the start of November. The best performers in global equity markets remained the 'Magnificent 7', a cohort of the world's largest companies, as Trump's policies and rhetoric suggest his presidency will be more pro-business than that of his predecessor. Within the portfolio, a new holding, HSBC All World index, contributed the largest amount to the portfolio's returns, adding +1.2% despite only being added at the end of September.

On September 30 2024, our Investment Team made changes to the Cautious portfolio, simplifying the asset allocation by splitting the portfolio into two buckets; 80% fixed income and 20% global equities. 
